October is Talk About Your Medicines Month. Topic: Opioid Prevention Throughout **All Ages**

Coughing, runny noses and sore throats are common this time of year and many people want to begin antibiotics as soon as symptoms of a cold appear. Unfortunately, antibiotics do not help kill viruses that cause the flu, colds, many sore throats, or bronchitis and in fact can do more harm than good when taken unnecessarily. Most infections are caused by either bacteria or viruses; bacteria are organisms that can be found everywhere throughout the human body while viruses are organisms that cause disease by invading healthy cells in the body.

Antibiotics should only be used to treat bacterial infections, not viral infections, as they will not work against upper respiratory illnesses caused by viruses. Taking antibiotics for illnesses such as colds, flu, runny noses, or most coughs will not make you feel better, cure the infection, nor keep others from catching the infection.

In fact, taking antibiotics for viral infections will increase the risk of antibiotic resistance later. When someone takes antibiotics, weaker bacteria are killed, but stronger germs may be left to grow and multiply. The repeated, improper use of antibiotics are a major cause of an increase in the development of drug-resistant bacteria. The problem with this resistance is that when antibiotics don't work, the consequences can include longer-lasting illnesses, more doctor visits, extended hospital stays and the need for more expensive medications.

Some resistant infections can even cause death.

To prevent antibiotic resistance there are some good practices to keep in mind:

- Do not take an antibiotic for a viral infection like a cold or the flu.
- Take necessary antibiotics exactly as the doctor directs and do not skip any doses.
- Don't take someone else's prescription.
- Talk to your healthcare provider about antibiotic resistance. Ask whether an antibiotic will be effective in treating your illness.
- Do not demand antibiotics for your children if their healthcare provider has decided they are not needed.

Be smart when using antibiotics. Remember that colds and flu are caused by viral infections that cannot be treated by antibiotics. Children and adults with viral infections will recover when the illness has run its course. The spread of viral infections can be reduced through frequent hand- washing and by avoiding close contact with others. Since viral infections can sometimes lead to bacterial infections, healthcare providers need to know if an illness gets worse or lasts a long time.

VETERANS LEGISLATURE AND NATIONAL NEWS



VFW Hosts Wounded Warriors Dinner:

In December, the VFW hosted 60 wounded warriors, their families and caregivers and staff from Walter Reed National Military Medical Center at The Capitol Hill Club for the yearly Aleethia Foundation's Friday Night Dinner. The VFW-hosted event gives VFW members an opportunity to connect with service members and help the healing process of service members who are receiving treatment at Walter Reed. "This is an event that I truly look forward to and cannot miss," said VFW Washington Office Executive Director B.J. Lawrence. "The bonds built – the conversations shared – nothing beats the feeling you receive when you dine with these patriots and their families."

Legislation Introduced to **Expand the Veterans Legacy Program:**

Senator Ion Tester (D-Mont.) and Senator Mike Rounds (R-S.D.) introduced VFW-supported S. 3058, a bipartisan bill to establish a grant program to conduct cemetery research and produce educational materials for the Veterans Legacy Program (VLP). Under the current program, the VLP awards contracts to universities, colleges, and institutions to develop educational programs to teach students and others about the veterans interred in national, state, or tribal cemeteries in their communities. Transitioning to a grantbased program would broaden the reach of the VLP beyond large universities to smaller groups that wish to engage with VA in memorializing veterans. "Perpetuating the memory and history of our dead is one of the VFW's founding principles." Said VEW Noticeal Local Local Local Control Con principles," said VFW National Legislative Service Director Carlos Fuentes. "The Veterans Legacy Program ensures the memories and stories of the brave men and women who have worn our nation's uniform are preserved in perpetuity." The VFW thanks Sen. Tester and Sen. Rounds for their support of this important program that promotes civic engagement and fosters respect for service and sacrifice.

Congress Passes NDAA Conference Agreement:

Congress passed the finalized version of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2020 (NDAA). The Conference Report includes a 3.1 percent pay raise for troops and improving occupational license portability for relocated military spouses. Other important VFW-supported provisions include expanding Arlington National Cemetery, granting full military honors for Medal of Honor and Prisoner-of-War Medal recipients, directing DOD to conduct post-deployment medical assessments for burn pits, toxic airborne chemicals, and other airborne contaminants, and incorporating blast exposure history into service members' medical records. The bill now goes to the president's desk, who has indicated he will sign it.



Air Force Awards \$50K Grant to **Help Treat Infertility:**

The Air Force is investing \$50,000 in a progesterone-testing kit company that could help service members who are trying to conceive. One year after a study estimated 37 percent of women currently serving report fertility issues, the Air Force awarded a Small Business Innovation Research grant to Proov, a company that makes \$40 kits for women to test their hormone levels. With the grant, Proov will provide free kits to Air Force couples who request them, and connect them with doctors specializing in fertility who may help them conceive naturally. The company said this five-minute at-home test is used by women to self-diagnose low progesterone levels and gain information about possible infertility factors. Progesterone is a necessary hormone for pregnancy, causing women to ovulate.



Congress Axed the Widow's Tax:

The Senate joined the House in voting to pass the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2020, which included the elimination of the Survivor Benefit Plan-Dependency and Indemnity Compensation offset. The VFW would like to thank Congress and all the individual advocates who joined the Axe the Widow's Tax movement and worked vigorously to terminate the unjust Survivors Benefits Plan-Dependency and Indemnity Compensation offset.



Three-Digit Suicide Prevention Number Approved:

The Federal Communications Commission has been approved to move ahead with a new three-digit phone number, 988, that will connect callers with the National Suicide Prevention Hotline. A report released this year, showed that creating a three-digit number, similar to 911, would improve access for people in crisis. Once 988 is working, calls to 988 will be routed to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, where veterans can already call 1.800.273.TALK, and press 1 for specialized support.



How Veterans Can Access Commissaries and MWR Facilities:

Starting Jan. 1, 2020, there will be expanded access for Commissaries, Military Service Exchanges, and Morale, Welfare and Recreation facilities for newly eligible veterans. Veterans who received a Purple Heart, were former POWs, or veterans with a service-connected disability rating will be able to physically access on-base facilities that were previously off limits to those veterans. Veterans seeking access to military installations will require identification. Veterans can use their current VA-issued Veterans Health Identification Card (VHIC). If a veteran is ineligible for a VHIC, DOD will temporarily accept the VA Health Eligibility Center Form H623A that indicates Priority Group 8E and an acceptable identification credential, like a REAL-ID-compliant driver's license or a U.S. passport.

National Guard Border Duty to Count Toward GI Bill Benefits:

Defense Secretary Mark Esper signed a memorandum stating that the National Guard troops who are stationed at the U.S. border will have their time there counted toward their GI Bill benefit. Currently National Guardsmen need 90 days of active-duty time to qualify for the Post-9/11 GI Bill at forty percent of the full benefit, and they need three years of active-duty time to qualify for the full 36-month benefit.

Citizenship for Children of Military Members and Civil Servants Act Passed:

The House passed H.R. 4803, Citizenship for Children of Military Members and Civil Servants Act. This bipartisan legislation was introduced by Representatives Doug Collins (R-Ga.) and Jerrold Nadler (D-N.Y.) to ensure that children of deployed military and government families benefit from provision of U.S. law that confers automatic U.S. citizenship and are not disadvantaged because their parents are serving our country abroad.

BALDWIN -- It was rarefied air on recent Friday night at The Phoenix Bar & Grill when the members of Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 10818 New Richmond / St. Croix County gathered to celebrate the Post's 30th anniversary.

On Oct. 30, 1989, 27 combat veterans founded Post 10818. In the ensuing years, the post has grown to over 400 members making it one of the largest veterans service organizations in western Wisconsin. A tradition of exceptional leadership has garnered the Post state awards and national acclaim.

"I consider it an honor to be in the presence of those with such dedication and commitment to supporting our service members, veterans and their families. On behalf of the more than 400 members of VFW Post 10818 and its auxiliary, I want to extend congratulations for all you've done to improve the lives of individuals, children and families across New Richmond and beyond these past 30 years," Post Commander Ron Ramos said Oct. 4.

Ramos sighted specific legislative accomplishments in which post members played significant roles. In 2015, Commander Dave Green and Quartermaster Ken House played central roles in the writing and passage of Wisconsin Senate Bill 153 which allows veterans organizations to receive vehicles from law enforcement agencies that cannot be auctioned off. The statute allows those vehicles to be sold or scrapped with at least 50% of those proceeds going directly to help veterans in need. Past Commander Jasen Pomroy lobbied on behalf of Post 10818 for passage of the Wisconsin Green Alert Bill which prompts an alert to be sent out statewide for veterans who go missing and may have mental health concerns. In 2019, Ramos lobbied for the passage of the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act which allows thousands of Vietnam veterans to receive the care they have earned.

When Ramos paused for a moment mid address, overwhelmed in the moment by the memory of his homelessness, and maybe to by his salvation, we were all reminded of how tenuous life is from day to day, and how precious.

There is no living without them, ghosts, memories of battle, brothers lost, it is a fact of war. A lot of times, in a room like this filled with veterans and their wives, it feels like they're just holding on behind the smiles and handshakes and bear hugs, a thin, ever so fragile truce between the living and the dead.

They shouldn't have to do any more, their service was enough, yet they do. Last year, members of Post 10818 volunteered over 12,000 hours of service in our community.

"The VFW exists to care for those who selflessly fall and sacrifice to protect the American way of life, a mission that won't change any time soon. Every member of the VFW has served our incredible nation and we understand the sacrifices every veteran has made and what is needed when they return home. We understand because we've been there. We will never stop fighting for veterans because we are an organization that shares the bond of battle and what it means to put your life on the line for our nation,' said Ramos.

























































Local family to be featured on 'Military Makeover'

STRUM, Wis. -- Since 2010 Steve Wojcik, his wife Terri, and their three daughters have lived in their Strum house.

But for the Wojcik's, their story began in 1998 right after Steve finished his time with the United States Marine Corps.

"The Marine Corps obviously number one. You want to be the best you can so I ended up joining," said Steve.

Following his service, Terri and Steve started a family but then 9/11 happened.

"I just felt the need, I had to get back in. You know we had two kids at the time and Terri said 'okay if this is something you have to do I stand by you' and she allowed me to go back in and serve," explained Steve.

He joined the army in late 2002 and served in Iraq.

In 2004, a vehicle convoy he was a part of was hit by an IED.

A year later he was given an honorable discharge and medical retirement.

"Getting into the army and getting into the Marine Corps, he obviously went into that not expecting anything out of it and just doing it to help out his country. And then still he'll help out anyone who needs help. So he's just a very selfless person," said their 16-year-old daughter Amberlee.

In 2010, now with three daughters, the Wojcik's moved to Strum where Steve continues to serve. This time as a Wisconsin State Trooper. "I think it's just service to the community. It's wanting to help out to make a difference," he explained.

It's a fellow trooper who nominated Steve and his family to be a part of 'Military Makeover'. The Wojcik's found out in January they were going to get the home makeover.

"Why our family, why is all this money going towards us cause we've never really had that before. I don't know how to say how it feels," said 14-year-old Alyson.

Steve asked himself the same question, saying there are many more deserving veterans out there.

But there's a reason, or four, he agreed to go through with the makeover.

"Knowing that the whole family was going to be affected, that's really the only reason I decided that I would accept to go through this process," he said.

And there are definitely parts of the renovation the family is looking forward to. "Absolutely it's going to be the basement," said Steve. "I'm also super excited to see what they do with the basement," added Amberlee.

"Yeah I'm excited to see the basement," agreed Alyson.










652nd Engineer Company Celebrations
